Haiku

The Haiku is a form of Japanese poetry dating back nearly a thousand years. Focusing on nature, a haiku must be exactly 17 syllables in length, and is written in the present tense about the present moment. This poem is meant to give your reader a pure snapshot of your topic/subject. See below for the complete haiku rules, an example and your own planning chart.

Haiku Rules:

Heating my body

- 1. The poem must focus on nature.
- 2. The poem includes some type of seasonal word or phrase, directly (*summer*, *rain*) or indirectly (*snow fluttered*); and some sensory image (*smell*, *sound*, *touch*, *sight*).
- 3. The poem has three lines and the total syllable count for the three lines must be 17 and follow these rules:

The first line must have five syllables.

The second line must have seven syllables.

The third line must have five syllables.
